Why do we ask?













- Determining a child's Indian status must be made as soon as possible to serve the best interests of the <u>Indian child</u> and to protect the interests of the child's tribe <u>RCW</u> 13.38.070(2).
- DCYF Caseworkers must identify and verify whether a child meets the definition of an Indian child early in the case to preserve the child's culture.





Washington State Department of

- The **Indian Identity Request** (09-761) must be completed during the initial contact with the parent(s)/Indian Custodian for **each** screened in Intake on all cases for each child, including those who have not been identified as victims.
- Upload the completed Indian Identity Request in FamLink – for all case types, regardless of the answers provided.
- Complete a Family Ancestry Chart (04-220) if the family identifies tribal affiliation, even when the family states or provides documentation they are a member.






Helpful Hints

- Ask! Even if the family has been asked before and said that they are not, ask again. Ask at every case transfer.
- If the family reports affiliation with a large tribe, attempt to gather more information. Ask if they know the band of the tribe that their family hails from or the village. Examples:
 - ✓ 22 federally-recognized Chippewa Tribes
 - √ 16 federally-recognized Sioux Bands & additional Sioux Bands in Canada
 - ✓ Approximately 90 Tribes/Native Villages of Aleut
- If the parents are not directly available, ask a representative from each side
 of the family, the person who has placement of the child or anyone else that
 can reasonably be expected to have information.






- When a family identifies

 with them if they are from

 Montana or from the
 Blackfoot Canadian First
 Nation.
- Blackfeet/Blackfoot
- ICWA only applies to federally-recognized Tribes.




Completing a Family Ancestry Chart








Processing a NAIR referral

Impacts of failing to send a NAIR referral



- May directly affect appropriate and timely ICWA application (Concurrent Jurisdiction, Placement Preference, Active Efforts, etc.).
- May result in possible:
 - Continuance of termination trial.
 - Overturning of a termination ruling by the court.
 - Inability for the court to accept a parent's relinquishment.
 - Vacating of an adoption ruling.



Impacts of failing to send a NAIR referral

- May lead to unexpected change of placements.
- Missed cultural and familial connections.
- Failed access to culturally appropriate services and providers for family.
- Lost resources and support for the family including education, health care, financial benefits, etc.
- Possible impact on relationships between WA State and federally-recognized sovereign nations.

Inquiry to Indian Tribe & the Family Ancestry Chart will be sent to all identified federally-recognized Tribes.

Inquiries must be sent out on behalf of each sibling separately.

NAIR Specialists must send out 2 Inquiry letters to out-of-state federallyrecognized Tribes and 3 Inquiry letters to WA State federally-recognized Tribes.

INQUIRY TO INDIAN TRIBE



Who determines eligibility?

- Only a tribe can determine a child's tribal membership status.
- A tribe's determination of membership or eligibility for membership is final.
- Neither the DCYF Caseworker, NAIR Unit, the court nor LICWAC can make the determination of an Indian child's membership status with a tribe.





Person Status definitions:

- **Member:** The tribe has responded that the child is a member. ICWA applies to the case.
- **Eligible for Membership**: The tribe has responded that the child is the biological child of a member and eligible for membership. ICWA applies to the case.
- **Non-ICWA**: The tribe has responded that the child is not a member, or the biological child of a member and is not eligible for membership. ICWA does not apply to the case.
- **Unable to determine**: inquiry letters have been sent, but the tribe(s) have not replied with a determination of a person's status or more information is needed for the tribe(s) to make a determination.



Tribal Involvement definitions:

- No reply: The Department has sent an inquiry to the tribe(s) but hasn't received a response yet
- **ICWA Jurisdiction**: The tribe has assumed jurisdiction.
- ICWA Party to Case: A federally recognized tribe has determined that the child is either: (1) a member, or (2) eligible for membership and the biological child of a member. The tribe has requested to be a party to the case in State court.
- **ICWA Consultant**: A federally recognized tribe has determined that the child is either: (1) a member, or (2) eligible for membership and the biological child of a member. The tribe will be involved in case planning but chooses not to take jurisdiction or have party status at this time.
- ICWA Non Involved/Notified: The child meets the federal ICWA definition of an Indian child, but the tribe will not be involved in the case at this time.
- None: The child is not a member or eligible for membership and the biological child of a member; therefore no tribal involvement in this case.
