If the guardian is eligible for R-GAP then a subsidy and services may be available. Children and youth in guardianships are not considered foster children or youth. Federal Timeline requires this permanency plan be achieved within 18 months of OPD		
Objective	Provides permanency for children or youth with an approved adult. Guardianship is to be discussed with parents and caregivers as an alternative to termination of parental rights (TPR) and adoption, when children or youth have been placed with the caregiver for more than six months. Legal relationship ends on the youth's 18th birthday.		
Legal Status	Parental rights are not required to be terminated. Although the parent continues to be the legal parent, the guardian has full care, custody, and control of the child or youth. The dependency is dismissed. NOTE: If the family later decides to adopt the child, they will be responsible for legal fees and will not be eligible for adoption support.		
Legal Custody & Caregiver Responsibility After Permanent Plan Achieved	The legal guardian maintains physical and legal custody with full responsibility for care, custody, and the right to make decisions for the child or youth. In rare circumstances modifications of the guardianship order may occur. Guardians can choose whether or not to provide an inheritance to a child or youth; it is not a right for the child or youth. For eligible relatives, Relative Guardianship Assistance Program (R-GAP) (https://www.dcyf.wa.gov/4340-guardianships/43401-relative-guardianship-assistance-program-r-gap) subsidy can transfer to a successor guardian if named in the R-GAP agreement and the legal guardian becomes incapacitated or dies.		
Birth / Adoptive Parent Rights / Responsibility	Guardianship orders must include visits. Visits are the responsibility of the guardian. The court may continue to order that the birth parent is still responsible for child support. In rare circumstances modifications of the guardianship order may occur.		
Financial Services Available / Monthly Subsidy	 A guardianship subsidized through RGAP (https://www.dcyf.wa.gov/4340-guardianships/43401-relative-guardianship-assistance-program-r-gap) may be available to licensed relatives that meet the requirements, per the R-GAP policy, that includes, but is not limited to the: Guardian being foster care licensed for at least 6 months and having placement of the child or youth for 6 months post licensing prior to establishing the guardianship. R-GAP agreement must be signed prior to establishing the guardianship. The program also reimburses up to \$2000 to guardians for up-front legal fees. Guardians who do not qualify for R-GAP may apply for financial support from the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program through the CSO. Household income is no longer reviewed to determine eligibility. Guardian may request a good cause waiver of child support against the biological parent when applying for TANF. 		
Medical	Medical and dental coverage is provided as specified in the R-GAP agreement. Evidence Based or Evidence Informed Counseling is available to guardianship families when requested. Or Guardians may apply for medical for the child or youth through the CSO or put them on their own insurance if their personal insurance plan allows.

Services Post 18 Years	Check with the R-GAP Gatekeeper to determine eligibility.
	R-GAP subsidy will automatically stop on the youth's 18th birthday, unless they meet eligibility requirements and the guardians or parents have provided documentation of the youth's continuation in high school prior to their 18th birthday.
	If the subsidized guardianship was established after the age of 16, youth may be eligible to receive support up to age 21 if the youth meets one of the following criteria:
	1. Enrolled in high school or high school equivalency program.
	2. Enrolled, has applied for, or can show intent to timely enroll in a post-secondary academic or vocational program.
	3. Participating in a program to promote or remove barriers employment, including part-time employment.
	4. Employed 80 hours or more a month.
	5. Unable to engage in any of the above activities due to a documented medical condition.
	Youth may also be eligible to apply for TANF or state family assistance (SFA) through the CSO, per WAC 388-404-0005.

	Legal relationship ends on the youth's 18th birthday.

	Although the parent continues to be the legal parent, the guardian has full care, custody or control of the child or youth.
	The dependency is dismissed, if applicable.
	NOTE: If the family later decides to adopt the child, they will be responsible for legal fees and will not be eligible for adoption support.

Financial Services Available / Monthly Subsidy	A guardianship subsidized through RGAP (https://www.dcyf.wa.gov/4340-guardianships/43401-relative-guardianship-assistance-program-r-gap) may be available to licensed relatives that meet the requirements, per the R-GAP policy, that includes, but is not limited to the guardian being foster care licensed for at least 6 months with the child or youth in placement prior to establishing the guardianship. The R-GAP agreement must be signed prior to establishing the guardianship. The program also reimburses legal fees paid up-front by the guardian up to \$2,000.
	Guardians who do not qualify for R-GAP may apply for financial support (TANF) through the CSO. Household income is no longer reviewed to determine eligibility.

Objective	Child or youth becomes a permanent and legal member of a family with all the legal rights of a birth child.
	Adoption is a lifelong legal relationship that cannot be modified in court.
Legal Status	Parental rights are relinquished or terminated unless it is a customary adoption established through Tribal court.
Legal Custody & Caregiver Responsibility After Permanent	Upon entry of adoption decree, the child or youth becomes the legal child or youth of the adoptive parents. The adoptive parents have all care, custody and legal rights to make decisions on the child's or youth's behalf. The child or youth has inheritance rights.
Plan Achieved	Title IVE adoption assistance can follow the youth to a subsequent adoption.
